30th Anniversary of ILEC: Our Origin and WLCs

Being based on the shore of Lake Biwa, Japan, ILEC has been addressing issues of our world's lakes and their basins since 1986 under the three pillars of its mission; namely; 1) Global Promotion of Lake Basin Management: 2) Organizational Support for the World Lake Conferences (WLCs), and 3) Environmental Training and Education. ILEC is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year, thanks to its long-lasting and productive partnerships with its many "lake friends," colleagues and supporters around the world.

What triggered the foundation of ILEC was a keynote speech from the then-Executive Director M. K. Tolba of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) at the 1984 Shiga Conference on Conservation and Management of World Lake Environment (LECS'84), held in Otsu, Japan. This Conference, now recognized as the first WLC, was successfully organized by the Government of Shiga Prefecture, which is home to Lake Biwa, the largest lake in Japan, with major participation by its citizens, local business owners, academia, and involvement of other lake stakeholders worldwide. The LECS'84, was a unique and unprecedented international conference focused specifically on lake management issues with involvement of such a wide range of participations. The Lake Biwa Declaration was launched at the end of the conference, summarizing key discussions from the event, and proposing guidelines of actions to be taken toward the future for sustainable management of lakes and their basins. Ever since then, the "Declarations" have traditionally concluded the fourteen WLCs subsequently organized all around the world, starting from the Mackinac Island of Michigan, USA, up to the most recent WLC in Perugia, Italy, where the WLCs have marked their 30 year long history in 2014.



Today, with the 16th World Lake Conference (WLC16) about to be convened in the beautiful island of Bali, Indonesia during November 7 - 11, 2016, this special issue of the ILEC Newsletter reflects on the history of the WLCs, with an overview of their Declarations, all featured on the next two pages. Before that, however, let us quote the aforementioned monumental keynote speech* by Dr. M. K. Tolba, leading to the origin of ILEC and the WLCs: "The process I have declared, including the concept of environmentally sound development, are designed to restore a healthy, nurturing relationship between parent and child, between people and lakes. The Earth's resources are not inexhaustible, and the time is not far off when our development practices must reach a sustainable steady state if we are to survive and prosper as a species. Freshwater lakes are a vital part of our natural resource heritage. Properly cared for, lakes will help support humankind indefinitely. But if lakes are abused beyond their limits, the parent, like the child, will die. ... I believe we should give special attention as to how

we can prevent the good work of this conference being forgotten. The subject we are considering is far too important. I am therefore proposing that we establish an international Shiga committee to follow up on the work of this conference, with a focal point established in this prefecture, you should try to meet annually or biennially at the site of another lake where steps have been taken to safeguard its environmental health."

Although Dr. Tolba unfortunately passed away last March, his inspiring message to future generations will live on, as it has so far, with our continued work and collaboration for sound assessment and management of the world's lakes. ILEC will continue to vigorously pursue this mission, centered around the successful organization of future WLCs. We want to again thank all our readers, colleagues and friends for their continued support for ILEC, as well as their partnership as we face future lake challenges.

Following which, the last 14 WLCs have been convened in Argentina, China, Denmark, Hungary, India, Italy, Japan, Kenya, and USA. **The next Conference, WLC16 is about to be convened in Bali, Indonesia during November 7 to 11, 2016.** Then the upcoming WLC17 is scheduled in October 2018 in Ibaraki, Japan.

The Declarations of Past WLCs

It has been commonly addressed in the past WLC discussions that "it is essential for humans to have healthy lakes for the future generation, and with the emerging concerns of accelerating deterioration of lakes, we must restore the lakes in sustainable condition, while recognizing socioeconomic situation." Initiated in the 1984's Lake Biwa Declaration, the WLCs have been concluded with statements from participants, announced as "Declarations", which evolved along the social development of the times. Here are some highlights of the past WLC Declarations:



Obituary: Two Inspirational Figures in ILEC History Pass Away

Last March, two inspiring individuals associated with the birth and growth of ILEC over the past years unfortunately passed away. We send our wishes that they may rest in peace, and also offer our sincere condolences to their families, their many friends and colleagues.

Geneva, March 28, 2016 - Former Executive Director of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), Dr. Mostafa Kamal Tolba, passed away at the age of 93. Dr. Tolba was a key figure behind the birth of ILEC. His seminal contribution dates back to 1984 on the shore of Lake Biwa, Japan, where the Shiga Conference on Conservation and Management of World Lake Environment (LECS'84), which is now considered to be the very first World Lake Conference (WLC), was held. As the then Executive Director of UNEP, he proposed the establishment of an international committee to realize the trans-generational succession of the Conference and to facilitate the development of a rational management plan for lakes and reservoirs and their basins. (The related article is featured on the cover page of this Newsletter.) Without his proposal, ILEC and WLCs may have not been established and flourished over time.

Copenhagen, March 5, 2016 - One of ILEC's founding members, Dr. Sven Erik Jørgensen, passed away at the age of 82. He was a world-renowned and award-winning ecologist and chemist, including the Stockholm Water Prize Laureate (2004) and the 1st Prigogine Prize Winner (2004). During his professional career, he was Professor Emeritus in the field of environmental chemistry at the University of Copenhagen. In his 20 years of service at ILEC, he helped this newly-born Foundation grow and expand its world-wide activities, notably with his major leadership as Scientific Committee Chair, from 1995 to the year of his resignation, 2006.
